How did we get here?

AFFORDABILITY:

- Since 2010, the region has grown nearly 20%.
- Housing demand has outpaced supply, driving prices up.
- Our region needs housing for **13,293** very low-income households who earn less than 50% of AMI (about \$17,000).



Plan to Address Homelessness

- **Goal 1:** Establish a coordinated and engaged regional system of care.
- **Goal 2:** Increase access and reduce barriers to homeless crisis response systems.
- **Goal 3:** Ensure households experiencing homelessness have access to affordable and sustainable permanent housing.

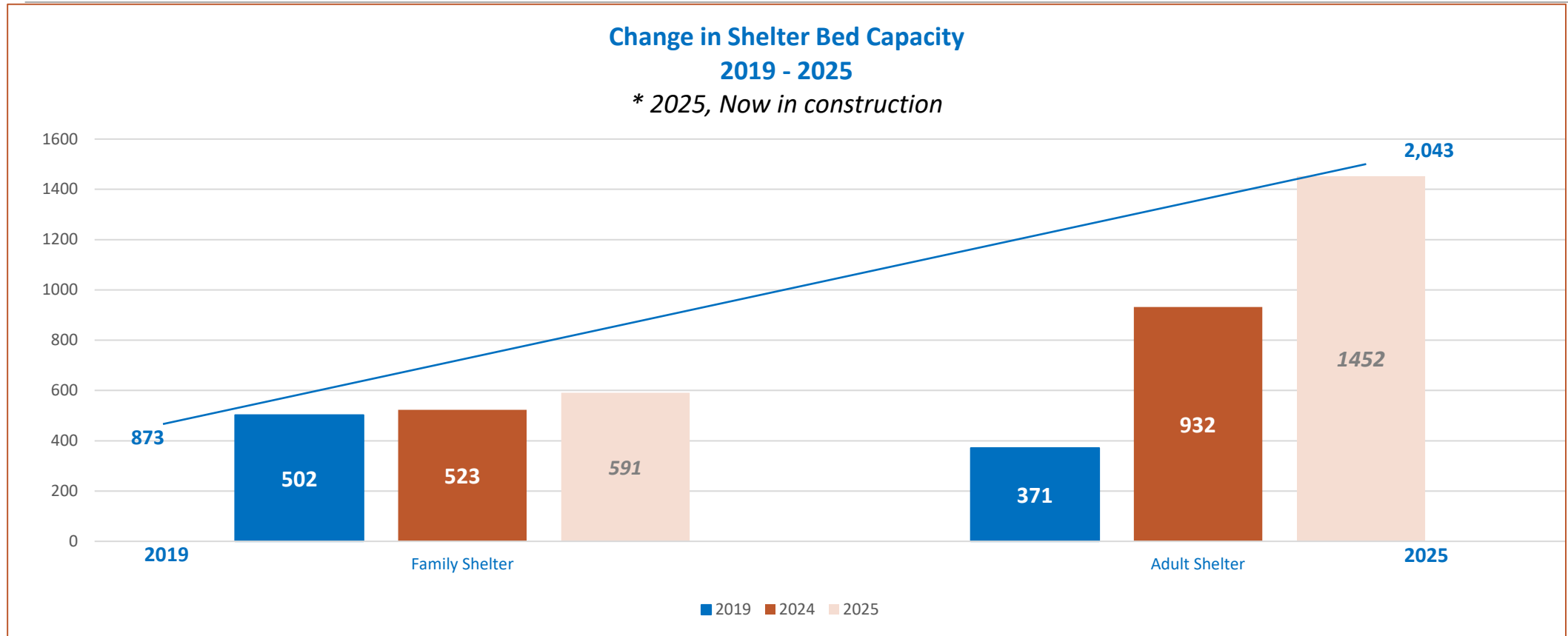

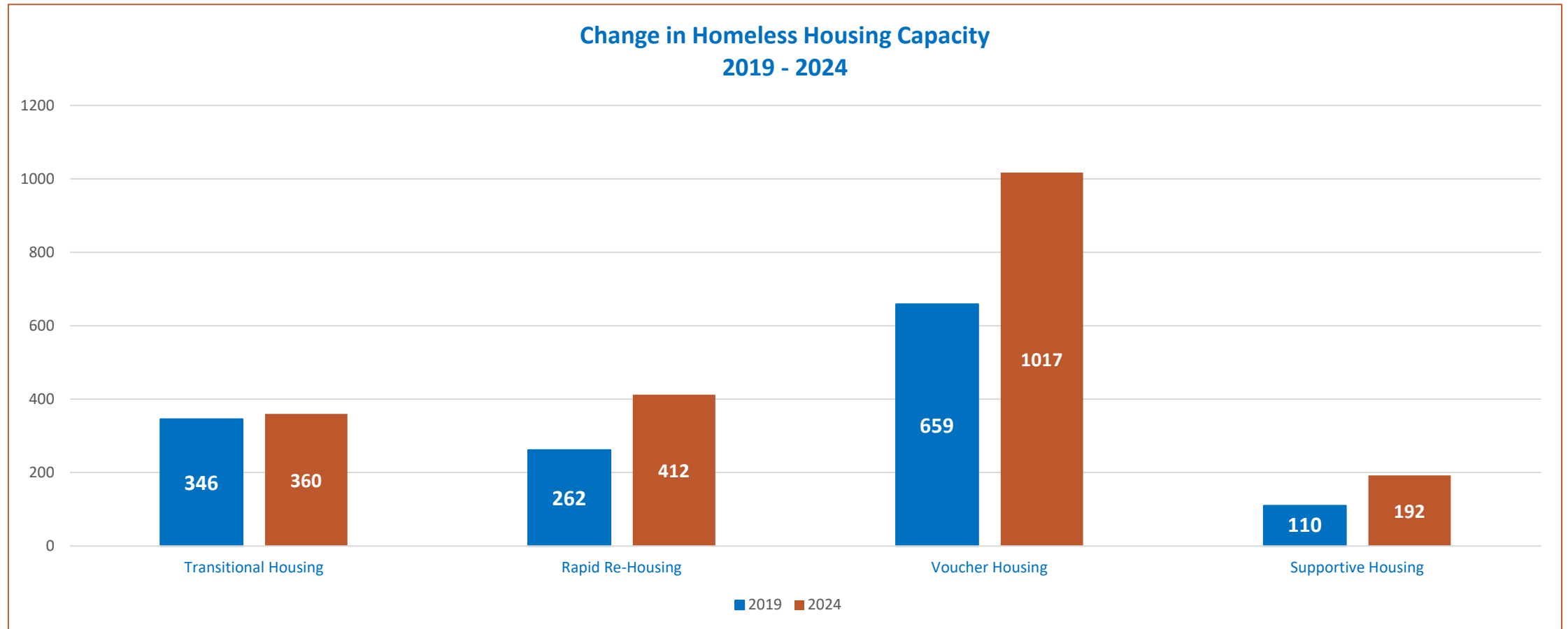

Where are we going?

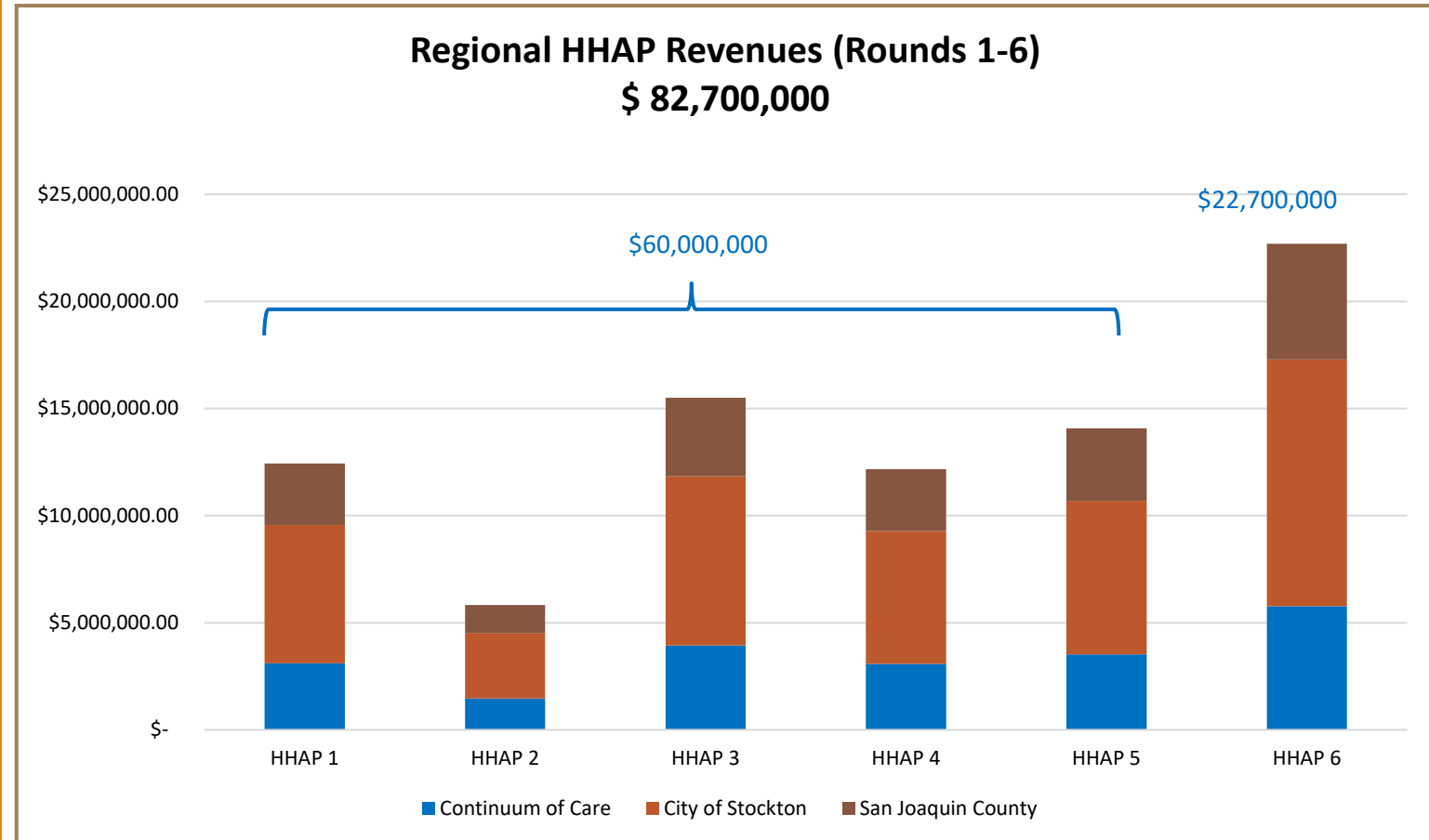
OPPORTUNITIES:

- Four cities have dedicated homeless services coordinators bringing partners together to address the crisis.
- There are new shelters and affordable housing projects being developed in nearly every community.
- Ramped up coordination and partnership with Behavioral Health and Justice Partners



HHAP FUNDS ALLOCATED to:

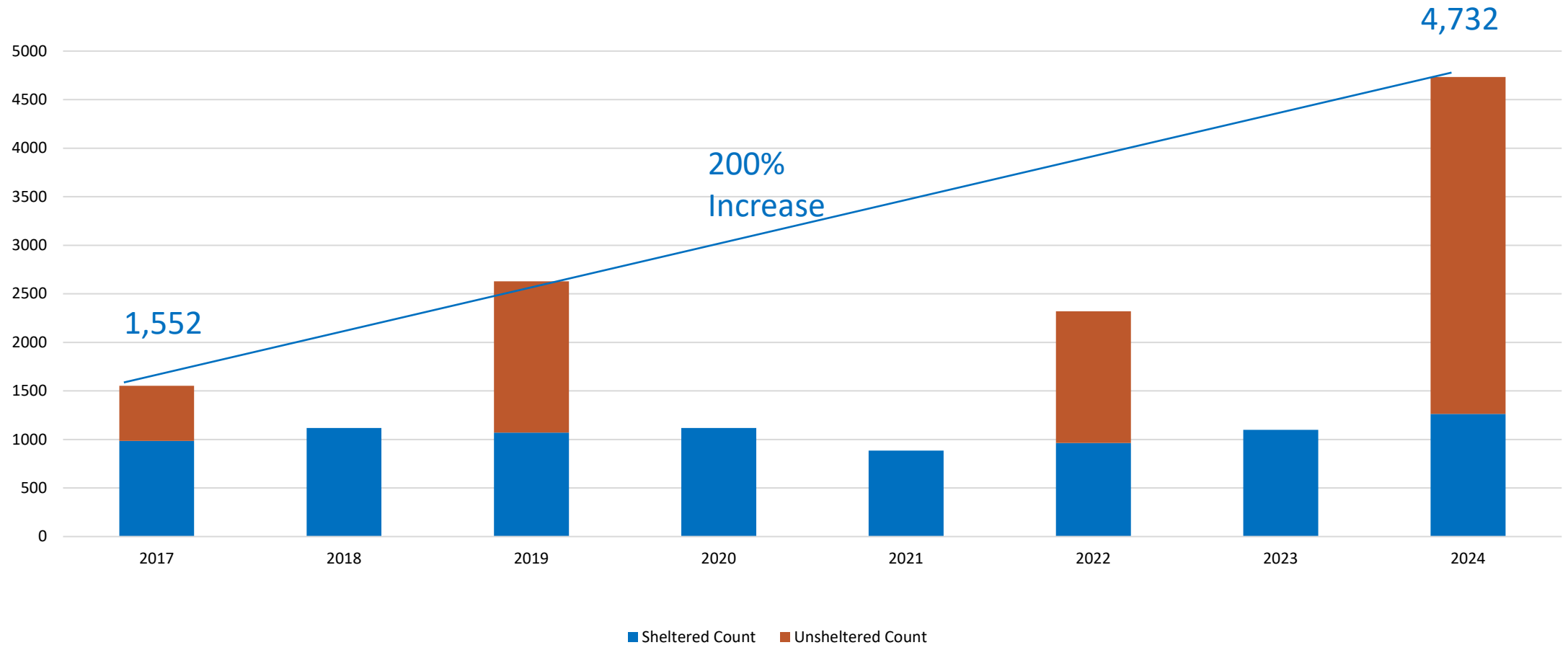
- SJ Continuum of Care

What We Built:

- **5** new shelters with **800** more beds.
- **8** new residential communities with **275** apartments for homeless households.

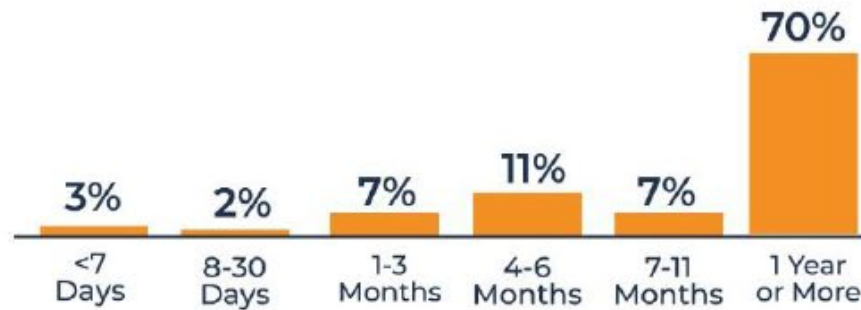
Point in Time Count 2017 through 2024 Sheltered and Unsheltered Persons

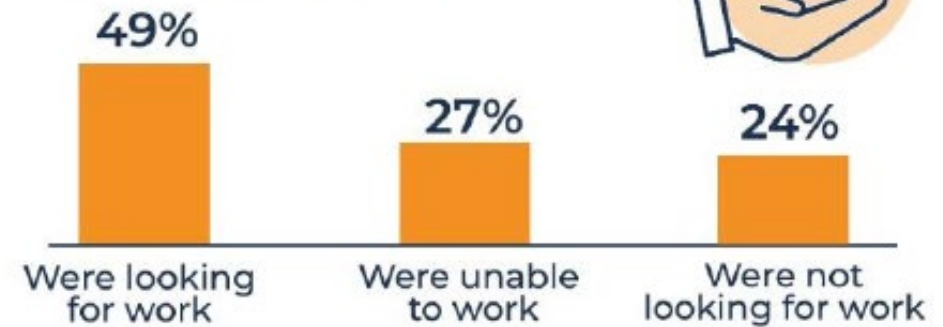

DISABLING CONDITION

A disabling condition is defined by HUD as a developmental disability, HIV/AIDS, or a long-term physical or mental impairment that impacts a person's ability to live independently but could be improved with stable housing.

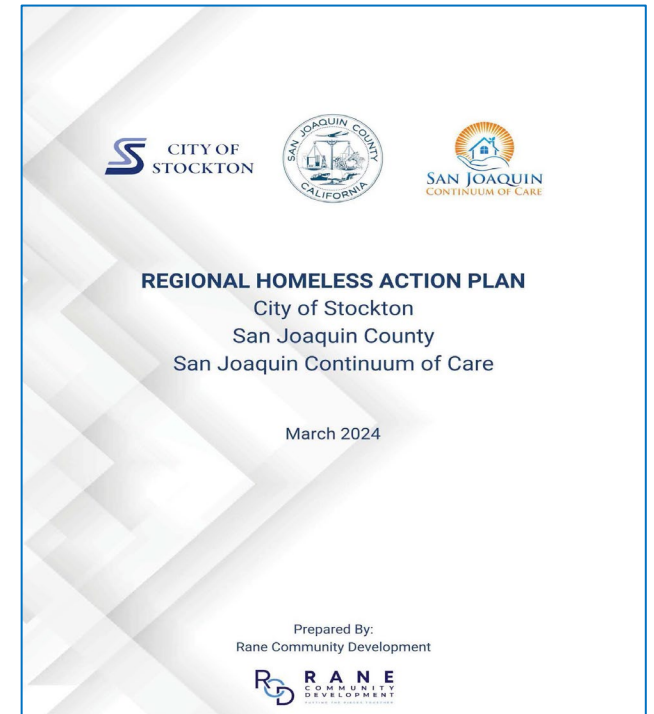

What is next for Round 6 Funds?

ELIGIBLE COST CATEGORIES

- Street Outreach
- Shelter Operations, including case management
- Temporary Rental Assistance with short-term supports
- Acquisition / Construction of new homeless housing units
- Specialty responses for homeless youth (**10%** of allocations)
- Program Coordination and Contract Administration

- *SUSTAIN EXISTING INTERIM AND PERMANENT HOUSING*
