

ORDINANCE NO. 1342

**AMENDING SECTION 4.16.030 OF THE TRACY MUNICIPAL CODE TO
AMEND THE DEFINITIONS TO INCLUDE "SENSITIVE AREAS"
CONSISTING OF DESIGNATED PARKS AND A 1000-FOOT BUFFER
AROUND SUCH PARKS**

WHEREAS, the City of Tracy (City) owns and/or controls extensive public assets within its jurisdictional limits; and

WHEREAS, the City Council, as the legislative body of the City of Tracy, has established, pursuant to its police powers and as reflected in the Tracy Municipal Code (TMC), rules and procedures for all residents to safely utilize and enjoy, as appropriate, such City assets; and

WHEREAS, On January 3, 2017, to specifically address ongoing issues occurring in parks and other public areas, the City Council adopted Ordinance 1229 amending Tracy Municipal Code (TMC) Section 4.16.180 – Unlawful Acts in Parks and Public Areas, delineating numerous prohibited activities in parks and public areas, including, but not limited to: storage of personal items, dumping garbage, open fires, alcohol use, and urination/defecation; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the adoption of Ordinance 1229, unpermitted activities within the City's parks and public areas continued to pose significant health and safety hazards to the residents of the City, and in particular, the youth; and

WHEREAS, in response to public concerns and City Council direction, staff provided an informational report to the City Council on May 17, 2022, regarding proposed amendments to TMC Chapter 5.12 (Camp Cars and Trailers) and TMC Chapter 4.16 (Use of Parks and Public Areas) that would further clarify prohibited acts in parks and public areas and strengthen the City's enforcement authority with respect to such acts; and

WHEREAS, staff presented a proposed Omnibus Ordinance effectuating the proposed amendments at the August 4, 2022, Parks and Community Services Commission meeting and at the August 22, 2022, Homelessness Advisory Committee meeting; and

WHEREAS, staff incorporated comments received and presented the proposed Omnibus Ordinance to the City Council on September 6, 2022, which the City Council adopted as Ordinance No. 1332; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the adoption of Ordinance 1332, the City's parks continue to be utilized for unpermitted activities, including camping and sleeping, that create unsafe and unsanitary conditions for the youth population of the City, who primarily utilize these parks; and

WHEREAS, the ongoing unpermitted activities also cause environmental degradation of the soils, waters and walkways of the parks; and

WHEREAS, various California statutes, under differing legal precepts and rights, have recognized the importance of regulating certain activities strictly at or near sensitive areas, so as to protect such sensitive areas most effectively; and

WHEREAS, some of the sensitive areas recognized under California law are environmentally sensitive habitat areas, schools, day cares, playgrounds, and other primarily youth areas; and

WHEREAS, some of the activities that are strictly regulated by California law at or near such sensitive areas are firearms, tobacco, cannabis, and alcohol; and

WHEREAS, cities across the State are actively taking steps to protect sensitive areas against unpermitted camping and sleeping; and

WHEREAS, based on the legal precepts and rights already codified in State law and to be further codified by future laws, staff proposes that the City Council amend Chapter 4.16 of the TMC to expressly define "sensitive areas" as certain "parks" within the City, so as to enable such public assets to be safely utilized by youth; and

WHEREAS, under TMC § 4.16.030, a "Park" is broadly defined as, "all City parks, community buildings and grounds, athletic facilities, open space areas and other grounds and facilities owned or operated by the City for park, recreation or open space purposes"; and

WHEREAS, on November 2, 2023, staff presented at the Parks and Community Services Commission (Commission) meeting, a proposal to designate a defined subcategory of "parks" and a 1,000-foot radius around such parks as "sensitive areas"; and

WHEREAS, the subcategory of parks consists of the subcategories of current and future planned City parks, including sports complexes, special use parks, community parks, neighborhood parks, linear parks and mini parks, totaling approximately 81 City parks, that are specifically described in the Parks, Recreation, and Trails Master Plan (Parks Master Plan) adopted by the City Council on October 4, 2022 (Resolution 2022-150), as follows:

(1) Neighborhood parks: Medium-sized parks that provide recreation opportunities within walking or biking distance for residents in one or more neighborhoods;

(2) Linear parks: A linear park provides trails and other recreational opportunities, allows for uninterrupted and safe pedestrian and bicycle movement throughout the community, and protects open space corridors;

(3) Community parks: large parks that provide opportunities for community-scale facilities to serve a substantial portion of the City;

(4) Sports complexes: Sports complexes are parks that are primarily devoted to sports fields, play courts, and other facilities for organized athletics;

(5) Mini parks: Mini parks are small-sized parks that provide basic recreation amenities for nearby residents in a specific neighborhood or subdivision; they create locally desired amenities and achieve the goals for all parks in this master plan, including comfort, inclusivity, maintenance, and sustainability;

(6) Special use parks: Special use parks are designed around a specialized facility or site use, such as an aquatic center or indoor recreation /community center, or to create a unique experience, such as a nature park or a downtown plaza;

WHEREAS, the Commission, passed with a 4-0-0 vote, staff's proposal and recommended that it be presented to the City Council for consideration and adoption; and

WHEREAS, so designating such areas as "sensitive areas" will enable the City to more effectively enforce against competing and prohibited uses that hinder or prevent safe use by youth; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TRACY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Incorporation of Recitals/Findings. The City Council finds and determines the foregoing recitals are true and correct and are hereby incorporated herein as findings and determinations of the City.

SECTION 2. Amendment of Section 4.16.030– Definitions. Section 4.16.030 of the Tracy Municipal Code is hereby amended by as set forth in the attached Exhibit 1

SECTION 3. CEQA Determination. The City Council finds that this Ordinance is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in accordance with CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(B)(3) pertaining to activities that do not have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment.

SECTION 4. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of the Chapter. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that one or more other sections, subsections, clauses or phrases may be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective upon the thirtieth (30th) day after final adoption.


SECTION 6. Publication. The City Clerk is directed to publish this ordinance in a manner required by law.

SECTION 7. Codification. This Ordinance shall be codified in the Tracy Municipal Code.

NOTICE AND DIGEST

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 4.16.030 OF THE TRACY MUNICIPAL CODE TO AMEND THE DEFINITIONS TO INCLUDE “SENSITIVE AREAS” CONSISTING OF DESIGNATED PARKS AND A 1000-FOOT BUFFER AROUND SUCH PARKS

This Ordinance 1342 amends Section 4.16.030 of the Tracy Municipal Code to amend the Definitions to include “sensitive areas” consisting of designated parks and a 1000-foot buffer around such parks to more effectively enforce against unpermitted uses. This Ordinance emphasizes the importance of protecting designated Parks where youth-oriented activities and amenities are located against unpermitted activities.

EXHIBIT 1

Chapter 4.16.030 (Definitions) is hereby amended as follows:

1) Amending the following definition to include the new language, as shown with underlining:

"Park" means all City parks, Sensitive Areas, community buildings and grounds, athletic facilities, open space areas and other grounds and facilities owned or operated by the City for park, recreation or open space purposes

2) Adding the following new definition, as shown with underlining:

"Sensitive Area" means a 1,000-foot radius surrounding any City Park falling into one or more of the following categories, as set forth in the Parks Master Plan (which may be amended from time to time):

(1) Neighborhood parks: Medium-sized parks that provide recreation opportunities within walking or biking distance for residents in one or more neighborhoods;

(2) Linear parks: A linear park provides trails and other recreational opportunities, allows for uninterrupted and safe pedestrian and bicycle movement throughout the community, and protects open space corridors;

(3) Community parks: Large parks that provide opportunities for community-scale facilities to serve a substantial portion of the City;

(4) Sports complexes: Sports complexes are parks that are primarily devoted to sports fields, play courts, and other facilities for organized athletics;

(5) Mini parks, page: Mini parks are small-sized parks that provide basic recreation amenities for nearby residents in a specific neighborhood or subdivision;

(6) Special use parks: Special use parks are designed around a specialized facility or site use, such as an aquatic center or indoor recreation /community center, or to create a unique experience, such as a nature park or a downtown plaza.



City Council and the Tracy Public Financing Authority Board will 1) conduct a public hearing relating to the issuance of lease revenue bonds by the Tracy Public Financing Authority, and 2) consider authorization of the sale and issuance of lease revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$60,000,000 to provide financing for the acquisition and construction of the multi-generational recreation center, improvements to El Pescadero park and related public improvements, declaring the intention to reimburse expenditures related to such public improvements, providing for approval of related documents, and directing related actions.

The proposed lease financing will provide funds for the acquisition and construction of, among other public capital improvements, a multi-generational recreation center in El Pescadero Park and improvements to El Pescadero Park. In connection with the lease financing, the City will lease certain real property and improvements to the Authority, and the Authority will lease such property back to the City.

The City of Tracy City Council will conduct a Public Hearing on Tuesday, January 16, 2024, at 7:00 p.m. or as soon thereafter as possible, in the Tracy City Council Chambers, 333 Civic Center Plaza, Tracy, to consider the following:

Adopt the Mitigated Negative Declaration and Mitigation and Monitoring Reporting Program, in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act, for the Multi-Generational Recreation Center and El Pescadero Park Improvement Project, Capital Improvement Project (CIP) 78178 and authorize the City Manager to execute and file the notice of determination. The City of Tracy proposes to redevelop the existing El Pescadero Park to create a new multi-generational recreation center on West Grant Line Road in Tracy.

The proposed multi-generational recreation center would consist of an approximately 61,300-square-foot, two-story building with a maximum height of approximately 35 feet that would include a three-court gymnasium, two multi-purpose rooms, kitchen, entry lobby, bouldering wall, teen lounge and technology area, makers space, restroom, offices, elevated running track and outdoor courtyard. Additional park improvements would include relocation and renovation of the existing dog park, skate park and basketball courts and installation of new trails, landscaping and lighting. In addition, the existing parking lot would be reconfigured, and new parking stalls added to expand the overall parking capacity and the existing access road/driveway from West Grant Line Road would be extended through the existing parking lot and along the southern and eastern boundaries of the site, connecting to West Kavannah Avenue at the northern boundary of the project site.

1. At the beginning of the proceeding the court will consider whether or not the interests of the minor child require the appointment of counsel. If the court finds the interests of the minor child do require representation by counsel, the court shall appoint counsel to represent the child, whether or not the child is able to afford counsel. The child shall not be present in court unless the child so requests or the court so orders.

2. If the parent of the minor appears without counsel and is unable to afford counsel, the court shall appoint counsel for the parent, unless the parent knowingly and intelligently waives the right to be represented by counsel. The court will not appoint the same counsel to represent both the minor and his/her parent.

3. The court may appoint either the public defender or private counsel. Private counsel appointed under this article shall receive a reasonable sum for compensation and expenses, the amount of which shall be determined by the court. The amount so retained shall be paid by the real parties of interest, other than the child, in proportions the court deems just. However, if the court finds that any of the real parties in interest are unable to afford counsel, the amount shall be paid out of the general fund of the county.

4. The court may continue the proceeding for not more than thirty (30) days as necessary to appoint counsel to become acquainted with the case. Dated: October 10, 2023

By order of this court you are hereby advised that you may appear before the judge residing in Department 2 of this court on FEBRUARY 16, 2024 at 8:30am then and there to show cause, if any, why ENRIQUE ISIDRO ALCANTAR-HERNANDEZ should not be declared free from your custody and control for the purpose of freeing ENRIQUE ISIDRO ALCANTAR-HERNANDEZ for placement for adoption. The following information concerns rights and procedures that relate to this proceeding for the termination of custody and control of said minor as set forth in Family Code Section 7860 et seq:

1. At the beginning of the proceeding the court will consider whether or not the interests of the minor child require the appointment of counsel. If the court finds the interests of the minor child do require representation by counsel, the court shall appoint counsel to represent the child, whether or not the child is able to afford counsel. The child shall not be present in court unless the child so requests or the court so orders.

2. If the parent of the minor appears without counsel and is unable to afford counsel, the court shall appoint counsel for the parent, unless the parent knowingly and intelligently waives the right to be represented by counsel. The court will not appoint the same counsel to represent both the minor and his/her parent.


3. The court may appoint either the public defender or private counsel. Private counsel appointed under this article shall receive a reasonable sum for compensation and expenses, the amount of which shall be determined by the court. The amount so retained shall be paid by the real parties of interest, other than the child, in proportions the court deems just. However, if the court finds that any of the real parties in interest are unable to afford counsel, the amount shall be paid out of the general fund of the county.

4. The court may continue the proceeding for not more than thirty (30) days as necessary to appoint counsel to become acquainted with the case. Dated: October 10, 2023
